Credits:

Credit defines the quantum of contents/syllabus prescribed for a course and determines the number of hours of instruction required per week. Thus, normally in each of the courses, credits will be assigned on the basis of the number of lectures/ tutorial & Practical works.

Hence, the Credits are assigned on the basis of the Lectures (L) / Tutorials (T) / Practical (P)

- L One credit for one hour lecture per week (1 credit course = 15 hours)
- T One credit for one hour lecture per week (1 credit course = 15 hours)
- P 0 credit for every two hours of practical (30 hours)
- Internship shall have 2 credits each year coming to a total of 10 credits, in addition to 210 credits.

a. Drafting: General principles of drafting and relevant substantive rules shall be taught b. Pleadings:

i) Civil: Plaint, written statement, interlocutory application, original petition, affidavit, execution petition, memorandum of appeal and revision, petition under Articles 226 and 32 of the Constitution of India.

ii) Criminal: Complaint, criminal miscellaneous petition, bail application, memorandum of appeal and revision.

iii) Conveyance: Sale deed, mortgage deed, lease deed, gift deed, promissory note, power of attorney, will, trust deed.

iv) Drafting of writ petition and PIL petition

The course will be taught class instructions and simulation exercises, preferably with assistance of practising lawyers/ retired judges.

Apart from teaching the relevant provisions of law, the course may include not less than 15 practical exercises in drafting carrying a total of 45 marks (3 marks for each) and 15 exercises in conveyancing carrying another 45 marks (3 marks for each exercise) remaining 10 marks will be given for viva voce.
